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HISTORY OF BEST & BRIGHTEST

Thirteen years ago, a group of community leaders worked together to bring to life an idea conceived by Ron Sachs: to honor and recognize some of Leon County's top high school seniors with scholarships for their work in diverse academic and leadership categories. But, a key difference from other scholarships was the overarching focus on students who have demonstrated a genuine heart and commitment for service. And so it began, in 2006, The Best & Brightest Awards — reflecting a positive partnership among Leon County Schools, Leon County Schools Foundation (during the first year), World Class Schools of Leon County, the Tallahassee Democrat, Envision Credit Union and Sachs Media Group.

In that first year of The Best & Brightest Awards, 81 students were selected for such high honors as school-based winners from the public and private high schools in Leon County. Major scholarships were then awarded in each of 15 categories in countywide finals, \$500 Winner, \$250 Runner-up, and \$100 Honorable Mention. Then, and in every year since, the students are evaluated on their academic record of excellence, school and community service and leadership. They also demonstrate personal interview effectiveness with a panel of three community leaders who serve as judges in each of the 15 categories. Through our

sponsors' continued support, the scholarships have significantly grown: \$1,500 Winner; \$750 Runner-up; \$500 Honorable Mention — and \$100 for all other school-based winners.

In 2011, we added an annual 8th Grade Essay contest — to reach down to the middle schools and to encourage a culture of service among those students who have been learning about civics and forming their ultimate interests. Public and private schools select their top three essays to compete for the countywide recognition, with scholarships of \$500 Winner, \$250 Runner-up and \$100 Honorable Mention.

More than \$629,000 has been awarded to 1,815 seniors and 350 eighth graders during those 13 years. We are proud to celebrate The Best & Brightest Awards by inspiring young people in our community to strive for academic excellence — but to also place a priority on service to others as an ethic to be embraced for life. Every year, the stories, examples and achievements of these outstanding senior high school student leaders inspire their peers and younger students to reach higher — and comfort all of us about the future of our community, state, country and world being entrusted to such fine human beings.

In addition to excelling in art, SAIL senior Karsyn Fletcher has spent her summers volunteering at summer camps at the Tallahassee Museum and LeMoyne Center.

As a counselor, Fletcher served as not only a role model but a friend to her campers. She shared her knowledge on “connecting the arts to the world around us.”

“I made it my own personal goal to help the campers learn how to embrace their creativity with the arts and the nature around them,” Fletcher said. “I became involved with local summer camps because I wanted to work one on one with kids to learn from them and their ways of creating while also wanting to inspire them to create more.”

Sometimes Fletcher runs into her former campers and their parents, who tell her they use aspects of what she shared with them in their everyday lives.

“My main goal is to share with my community what has benefitted me, in hopes that whatever it is can benefit them,” she said.

At school, Fletcher has been very active in the Robotics Club, where she presented the benefits of STEM and art while participating in robotics competitions. She has created

permanent installments of artwork in the SAIL gym and was chosen to design her school’s new banner for after school clubs.

SAIL Art instructor Sheri L. Nilles Marshall said Fletcher has always stood out among her peers not only for her talent and dedication to her pursuits, but for her integrity and selfless nature.

“Karsyn used the last four years as an opportunity to blossom from a talented kid into a renaissance woman graduating with high honors,” Marshall said. “Karsyn is the student who will graciously accept and dole out both praise and criticism and she is always asking for the latter, knowing it will only make her better.”

Fletcher’s art work has been entered into the Winter Festival Art Show as well as the LeMoyne High School Art Gallery, and she was SAIL’s MLK Dreamers and Doers winner in 2016.

In 2017, Fletcher was hired at the local art teaching studio Painting With a Twist.

“I hope to leave my school and classmates feeling like they can express themselves without needing to compete with others when creating,” she said. “In my future endeavors I want to inspire those I meet to pursue their own artistic personal goals, while continuing to pursue my own passion for the arts.”

ALEXANDER SOBESKI

Home School

Helping the homeless in Tallahassee has been a passion of Alexander "Xander" Sobeski's for years.

He became involved in the Homeless Bag Project by gathering supplies like water bottles, snacks, gift cards, hygiene products, blankets and clothes. Any time Sobeski would pass a homeless person he would stop and give them a bag.

"This helped me realize how fortunate I am to grow up the way I did, and seeing the reaction of these people showed me that giving back to the community in this way is a great deed," Sobeski said.

Another passion of Sobeski's is sports. As a triathlete in football, baseball and weightlifting, Sobeski was recognized by the Tallahassee Quarterback Club as the Scholar Athlete of the Year in 2017.

Sobeski earned three varsity letters in football and started every game for Lincoln as a linebacker. He was credited with 124 tackles his senior season, 80 of them solo, and also had three sacks and five forced fumbles. He made First Team All-Big Bend for defense and was elected to play in the Florida/Georgia Battle of the Border All-Star Game.

Sobeski used his athletic skills to assist coaches

in summer baseball camps. Last year he invited two boys to the camp with cerebral palsy, one in a wheelchair and one with a walker. Sobeski and the coaches altered the camp so the boys could participate in the activities.

"At the end of the week, though tired and exhausted, the boys were begging to come back," Sobeski said. "This was one of my greatest feelings knowing that I helped two boys who normally would not have the opportunity to play ball."

After a flood in August of 2016, Sobeski traveled to Baton Rouge, where he distributed donations and met with families.

Science instructor Teri Hall said Sobeski displays model character morally and ethically and "is a young man who will live up to his commitments."

"Alexander is definitely a team player who is able to work together with others on his team but who can also take charge when necessary," Hall said.

Sobeski hopes to leave a legacy showing that home school students are athletic and are not awkward.

"With my accomplishments I believe I have started to show a difference in my community," Sobeski said. "I hope to prove that with a hard work ethic and given the chance you can accomplish anything on and off the field."

Running has always been a big part of Chiles senior Ana Wallace's life, as she has attended races since she was a child.

As she grew older, Wallace began to volunteer with the Gulf Winds Track Club, assisting in races.

Wallace has also participated in Strides for Seizures, running upwards of 800 miles in 2016 and 2017 and donating \$80 to help provide educational services to families and patients experiencing seizures.





A native of Kenya, Brenda Gikunda's first language is Swahili and she is fluent in other tribal languages.

After learning of an influx of refugees from Congo and Uganda in Tallahassee, Gikunda was called on to help two refugee students at Rickards. As a translator and liaison, she was often called out of class to help and sacrificed study and lunch time doing so.

"I thought, if I could be the one to make them feel comfortable in a situation like this, then I would do everything in my ability to do so," Gikunda said.

Gikunda has helped the students express their feelings to their guidance counselors and the administration. She also introduced them to clubs and activities like the Spanish Club and Multicultural Club as well as bake sales and potlucks.

Helping the refugees reminded Gikunda of her struggles assimilating.

"I am so happy that I am able to use my bilingual abilities to help others, especially those who I have been in their shoes," she said.

She found a little piece of home in the students and hopes they found the same in her.

"This experience has allowed me to clearly understand how to value others and their feelings and has also made me aware of my

own individual abilities and power to make a difference in my very own community," Gikunda said.

Rickards guidance counselor Linda Thompson called Gikunda a "heroine" who has excelled in the International Baccalaureate Program and is also fluent in Spanish.

"Students who see her success know that they too have a place in this country," Thompson said of Gikunda.

Last summer, Gikunda spent time at the Gaitu Health Clinic in Kenya as a translator, collecting patient information and counting and organizing medicine.

Gikunda has also been active with Habitat for Humanity, and volunteer coordinator Melissa Meadowcroft called her instrumental in mentoring and leading her peers on five building projects.

"Her dedication to the notion of eliminating substandard housing and homelessness is exemplified by her selfless commitment to the ideals of the Habitat humanitarian effort," Meadowcroft said.

Gikunda hopes to leave a legacy of love and selflessness.





Shirley has served as features editor and sports editor for Tomahawk Talk, and as a senior she became editor-in-chief. Florida High English teacher and newspaper and yearbook adviser Leslie Klein said Shirley became an editor whom every staff writer turned to with questions and concerns, and she went above and beyond representing Florida High in a competition.

This year, Shirley joined the yearbook staff.

"I have nothing but respect for Lauren's enthusiasm and willingness to take on any challenge that she is presented with," Klein said. "I know that this will transfer to anything she puts her mind to, making her successful in all aspects of life."

Shirley has been a member of student government, helping set up various events. Last year she was head of the prom committee, conducting year-round meetings.

She received a Gold Award in Girl Scouts for partnering with the Leon County Animal Shelter. She has volunteered to help homeless people in Nashville and Ridgecrest, North Carolina and volunteered with the Boys and Girls Club of South Alabama.

Shirley hopes to be remembered as someone who is passionate about social justice and equality.

"I hope I have inspired at least one person to care about what is happening in the world around them," she said.

She was also involved with Leon County’s Alliance for Girls, creating templates and collecting contacts of all girl-related organizations in the Big Bend. She has spoken on youth panels at the National PACE Conference and Ladies Learning to Lead Conference..

She spent months planning and coordinating the Brighter Tomorrow initiative to raise money for installing solar panels in a village in India and to give them electricity. For her school’s Key Club, she participated in multiple service events like the Turkey Trot. With the National Honor Society, she helped with events like Dance Marathon.

In her free time, Sorrell has starred in several productions at Young Actors Theatre.

“She is a young woman with a wide variety of skills and talents, as well as a sunny and engaging personality,” said Rickards IB instructor Janalee Jarrett. “She is poised to make not only a local impact, but to be a force for good at a global level. She is a young woman of unquestionable integrity and seemingly unending energy.”

Sorrell plans to make sure her organization continues after she graduates.

“My legacy will be the students who have grown from YLSC’s support and program, and brought their own initiatives into the community,” she said.

At the beginning of her junior year, Hana Kiros reached out to WFSU with the idea of putting on a show for teens to discuss politics.

"This program was born from my dissatisfaction with the lack of public arenas available where Americans from different backgrounds could just sit together and civilly discuss politics," she said.

As a result, Kiros became founder and executive producer of "Common Sense: Teens Take on Politics," which airs monthly on WFSU. Through each episode, she seeks out three to six teens of varying political beliefs to discuss politics. Kiros herself has served as a panelist and also works on the technical aspect of production.

"I truly believe that broadcasting such conversations helps to bridge divides within my community," Kiros said. "I hope that the 112,000-plus listeners the series has reached thus far will be encouraged to engage with those from whom they differ."

Kiros also created the Superintendent Forum for superintendent candidates to field student-posed questions. Since last February, she has developed presentations utilizing microbots to engage elementary school students in their core curriculum.

At school, Kiros has been involved with the National Honor Society, participating in projects such as the Lake Henrietta Clean Up following Hurricane Irma. She served as hospitality chair of Dance Marathon, for which she coordinated fundraising efforts benefiting Shand's Children's Hospital and FSU College of Medicine's Pediatric Outreach Program. She also worked on the tech crew for Pangaea, Rickards' annual multicultural event.

She has volunteered at Hartsfield Elementary School to help make ornaments to be sold during the Arts & Antiques Fair, and she also volunteered at Oak Ridge Elementary School on behalf of Girls Get Information Technology, a local STEM nonprofit.

"Ms. Kiros is driven by the desire to do good, personally, for those who immediately surround her, and also to effect change in the world," said Rickards teacher Jose Fiallos. "And then not simply to be a positive force for those whose lives she affects, but to then share the knowledge and understanding that she has acquired so that others can be positive forces as well."

"I hope to be remembered as a person that did what they could to better the places they were, and as someone that engaged with the world around them," Kiros said. "I think one of the primary joys of being able to not only witness, but influence the world around you."

For an hour on Fridays in the computer lab, he “would experience a metamorphosis, emerging from my chrysalis as a confident mentor students could rely on.”

“Witnessing the germination and growth of the seed I planted propels me to do what I can to continue cultivating a generation of problem solvers as a computer scientist and an educator,” he said.

Fagbamila-Zakare started the Muslim Culture and Heritage Club at Lincoln, which put on the fundraiser “Kebabs for a Cause,” which raised money for refugees. He has also been an active member of Brain Bowl and Model United Nations and volunteered at a retirement home.

“Ibrahim’s greatest strength is his desire to learn and apply his knowledge,” said Lincoln teacher James Richmond. “It is obvious that his greatest motivation is the intrinsic desire to self-improve and I can say with confidence that his desire for academic success comes from within.”

“I hope to inspire students in the coming years to make the transition from consumer to producer, gaining an understanding of the technologies they use every day, and acquiring the skills to create their own,” Fagbamila-Zakare said.

During her volunteer ship at TMH, Ahmed’s mentor introduced her to the Telehealth monitoring initiative, which encompasses a variety of technologies and tactics to deliver virtual medical, health, and education services

“I believe that one should never have to go through such extensive measures just to get necessary healthcare. This was my main motivation for volunteering my heart into making the Telehealth monitoring program a reality for patients.”

As this new initiative progresses into the future of healthcare, Ahmed predicts it will impact thousands in Tallahassee and the surrounding areas.

The success of her newly instated program led Ahmed to expand her cause. She became a member of Youth Health Leadership Tallahassee (YHLT), where she learned to design community-based health outreach projects and implement health education on a broader level.

Her role in YHLT led her to truly apply her knowledge in combination with leadership skills to make a direct impact on the community.

She assisted in creating nutrition outreach presentations that were then demonstrated in Frenchtown and local elementary schools.

Ahmed has authored a book about childhood obesity, which will further support her endeavor to educate the community about the importance of watching our health.

Through her efforts, she became better at interacting with others, strengthened her organizing and leadership skills, and became a devoted servant to enhance literacy, awareness, and educational outreach efforts in the community.

Ahmed is currently working on a research project to further understand nutritional label literacy in Tallahassee while training a new generation of health volunteers through service clubs she has founded.


